- 1. Let G be a finite group which acts transitively on a finite set S with $|S| \ge 2$. Show that there there exists an element $g \in G$ which has no fixed points, i.e., for all $s \in S$, $g \cdot s \neq s$ (i.e., $S^{\langle g \rangle} = \emptyset$).
- 2. Given a group G, define the following normal subgroups inductively: $Z_0(G) = 1, Z_1(G) = Z(G), \text{ and } Z_{i+1}(G) \ge Z_i(G) \text{ the subgroup of } G$ such that $Z_{i+1}(G)/Z_i(G) = Z(G/Z_i(G))$. The chain $Z_0(G) \le Z_1(G) \le$ $Z_2(G) \le \cdots$ is called the upper central series of G. A group is called
 nilpotent if $Z_c(G) = G$ for some integer c, and the smallest such c (if
 it exists) is called the nilpotence class of G.
 - (a) Let p be a prime and suppose that G a group of order p^a where $a \ge 1$. Show that G is nilpotent.
 - (b) If $a \ge 2$, prove that G is of nilpotence class $\le a 1$.
- 3. Let R be a commutative ring with 1 and M be an R-module. For a prime ideal $\mathfrak{p} \subset R$, let $M_{\mathfrak{p}} = S^{-1}M$ be the localization of M at the multiplicatively closed set $S = R \mathfrak{p}$. Prove that

M = 0 if and only if $M_{\mathfrak{p}} = 0$ for every prime ideal \mathfrak{p}

- 4. Let R be a finite commutative ring with 1. Show that every prime ideal is maximal. (Hint: First show every finite integral domain is a field.)
- 5. Let D_8 be the dihedral group of order 8, so the symmetries of a square. Compute (with justification) the character table of D_8 .
